Clearwater AAUW Board Meeting March 13, 2013

The meeting at St. Petersburg College, Administration Building, was called to order at 9:45 am. In attendance: Rita Garvey, Barbara Perkins, Carol Zeph, Dana Garlick, Jan Stephens, Maureen Melton, Gay Gentry, Marian Major, Kathleen Kimpel, and invited guest, Carol D. Richardson.

Programs Dana Garlick reported on two upcoming Women History Month programs in March. Per Shirley Crumbley, Women on the Way (WOW) Coordinator at SPC, a jointly sponsored table (AAUW-SPC) will be staffed by our members as part of an Organization Fair to be held outside on the afternoon of March 20th. Rita suggested we design a flyer aimed at interested students about our role in the community. Secondly, the Branch general membership meeting will be held on March 27th at 11:00 in the SPC Library to mark Women's History Month and will feature a screening of Susan Sarandon's narrated- PBS chronicle of the Suffragette Movement entitled "One Woman, One Vote". The viewing will be a bag lunch opportunity for students on campus to join us and get acquainted with our members.

Membership Dues renewal notices will be prepared for sending in March. Maureen Melton asked for coordinating information which Dana will supply to her. Dues request will go out with the Newsletter and must be paid by June.

Treasurer's Report fundraising goal exceeded our expectations at over \$5400, with expenses approximated at \$1070. Regarding the theatre show at Wilson Playhouse, 179 of 180 tickets for the production "Damn Yankees" were sold, and some additional cash donations were received from those who were unable to attend as well!

Carol went on to report that two basket assembling meetings produced an output of over 20 baskets which boosted income substantially over previous years in that category. The Francis Wilson Playhouse representative assured us that she will reserve a production date for *Mame* next spring 2014 when we've decided on future fundraising projects for program year 2013-14.

Jan Stephens, Fundraising Chair, submitted an evaluation report for the fundraiser with ideas and suggestions going forward. She urged the Board to consider prioritizing membership outreach via this event in the future, and emphasized publicity as an under-utilized resource in achieving our goals.

Invited Guest Speaker our guest, Carol Richardson, Membership Representative for FL AAUW/Miami. Carol presented a 20-minute power point on demographics of Pinellas County as well as trends in utilization of social media technologies for communication and outreach to millennial and generation X-ers (younger persons in their 30's and 40's). Carol made the following points:

- All state chapters are investigating new outreach tactics and membership growth goals.
- Chapters can be aided by the National resources on the website: see www.AAUW.org
- Maintaining an interactive website (Constant Contact, for example) costs about \$125.00 per year.
- Tampa Bay area demographics show approx 1Million population with median age of 45 years.

• NCCWSL Scholarships for young women leaders are an excellent way to encourage younger members while activating the college-branch partnership.

Discussion: Currently our Branch membership is 44, broken out as 6 honorary, 1 life, 3 dual memberships. A special Newsletter will be sent out to potential student members. Reduced dues range for students was suggested at the \$20.00 per annum level. WOW will be encouraged to present the student recipients in the fall at a general membership meeting. Student members should be included in our annual Directory, and all efforts need to be coordinated with Shirley Crumbley at SPC. A motion passed that we charge \$5.00 per annum dues for SPC students who are scholarship recipients. Rita Garvey will design a membership sign-up form and evaluate this reduced-fee effort at year end.

With ever-limited local resources, of obvious concern is the need for us to collaborate with like-minded organizations locally (YMCA, for example) to both extend our reach and increase awareness of our contributions to the community.

It was agreed that future program areas to be discussed in conjunction with membership outreach are: NCCWSL, Equal Pay for Women, and Tech Trek.

New Business/Announcements: The Florida AAUW Convention will be held in Orlando on April 19 - 21. Registration and mileage will be reimbursed by the Branch; hotel charges can be shared to reduce member costs. We are assigned two voting members in addition to the President.

On April 10, 2013 the Board will meet at SPC Admin Room 145 at 9:30. The general meeting will be held April 11, with a program on Identity Theft at the Clearwater Main Library beginning at 10:00.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 11:15 am.



KIRKUS REVIEW*: A look at how, by inventing philanthropic institutions, American women played a crucial role shaping the American economy since the first days of the Revolution.

Gaudiani (Generosity Unbound: How American Philanthropy Can Strengthen the Economy and



Strengthen the Economy and Expand the Middle Class, 2010, etc.) and her husband and business partner Burnett, educators and economic consultants to philanthropic organizations, consider the not-forprofit social sector to be a uniquely American third sector of the economy "that mobilizes citizen idealism and responsibility [and] provides a marketplace where buyers and sellers of ideas to improve the nation (and the world) can meet to do

business." The authors demonstrate that in each of the wars in U.S. history, beginning with the Revolutionary War, women have played a major role in organizing financial support for soldiers--e.g., going door to door in Philadelphia. Esther Reed raised \$7,000 to purchase new uniforms for Washington's soldiers and inspired women throughout the colonies to do likewise. Charity work provided the vehicle for enterprising women of that day whose other activities were severely restricted. Reed's activities, write the authors, began a tradition of female civic leadership and led to the creation of social entrepreneurship. The Russell Sage Foundation, established by Margaret Olivia Sage in 1907 and still active today, became the nation's first think-tank, and it began with the mandate of looking at the impact of social welfare on workers' lives and issued a number of groundbreaking studies on the need for workplace safety and public-health measures. In 1803, the first Widows' Society, headed by Isabella Graham, received \$15,000 from the New York State legislature to support its work. Although the book ends with the role of women such as Francis Perkins and Mary McLeod Bethune in the New Deal, its implications for today are clear.

An interesting sidelight on the transformation of laissez-faire capitalism and the shaping of markets toward more ethical behavior.
